

Our academic staff have wide-ranging interests and are committed to high quality musical research. 90% of our research environment is considered conducive to producing world-leading or internationally excellent research (REF 2021). Based in Cardiff, a culturally very lively and affordable city, we are ideally located for studying music. The city has several world-class venues, such as the Wales Millennium Centre, which is the home of Welsh National Opera and the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, and St David's Hall, which hosts Cardiff Singer of the World and concerts from many visiting orchestras. Why study music?

Music is fundamentally a social activity; it brings us together, creates social cohesion, and allows us to express ourselves.

Our degree programmes provide an opportunity to become immersed in the world of music, from Western art music, to jazz, popular music, and musical traditions from around the globe. From composing and performing to conducting, you'll analyse how a piece of music is constructed, and study the social and cultural contexts of music from an array of cultures and traditions.

We have a diverse and rich range of School-led music groups, from the Symphony Orchestra, Pop Collective, and West African Drumming Ensemble to our many student-led groups such as Big Band, Brass Band and Operatic Society.

Whatever your musical interests, you are sure to find an ensemble for you. You'll also benefit from the teaching expertise of instrumentalists and singers with international performance careers. Our graduates are highly employable, possessing vital transferable skills that are important to employers both within and beyond the music profession. Whether performing and composing, working with others in ensembles, or constructing robustly argued essays, our degree programmes allow you to develop skills in leadership, teamwork, communication, creativity, problemsolving, and critical thinking.

Recent graduates have gone on to successful careers as performers, composers, teachers, music producers, audio engineers, music journalists, and arts managers and administrators. Many have also found employment outside of the music industry, with destinations including the Civil Service, law, IT, banking, and management.

Studying with us

Cardiff is a vibrant capital city with rich musical traditions.

Cardiff has a rich and diverse musical culture, with a thriving live music scene and a history of producing world-class musicians. The city is home to a number of legendary music venues, including the iconic Clwb Ifor Bach and Utilia Arena Cardiff, which regularly hosts major international acts.

Cardiff is also home to several music festivals throughout the year, including the award-winning Sŵn Festival. The city's musical heritage and contemporary scene make it a vibrant and exciting destination for music lovers.

At our purpose-built building in the heart of Cardiff, we have all the facilities you need to succeed in your studies. It offers lecture theatres with modern lecture-capture technology, seminar rooms, practice rooms, ensemble rooms, and electro-acoustic studios.

Performance and studio facilities

Our 250-seat concert hall hosts professional public concerts and student-led events throughout the year, as well as being used daily by our students for teaching and rehearsals. The space is integral to the life and work of the School and is central to our ensembles, student performances and concert series.

Much of the performance in our concert hall connects directly with our undergraduate programmes, with a range of visiting professional performers frequently holding masterclasses and workshops in both composition and performance.

Our music studios are fully acoustically treated and equipped to industry standards. The main studio also has an attached live room for multitrack recording, voiceovers, and overdubs.

Instrumental lessons

Music students receive instrumental or vocal lessons as part of their course. Many of our practical tutors are members of either the BBC National Orchestra of Wales or Welsh National Opera.

Vocal or instrumental tuition is fully funded by the School on your principal study instrument if you're taking a Practical Musicianship module. This includes accompaniment at your final recital. You'll receive 24 half-hour lessons over the course of the year. This increases to 24 hours of lessons in the final year for BMus students taking the Recital module.

Student life

Our small student body is friendly, collaborative and very active.

Students regularly perform together in School-led ensembles and concerts, as well as student-run groups. The student-led Music Society, which is open to students across Cardiff University, organises social events, competitions, performances, and trips abroad, as well as lunchtime concerts which are open to all.

International students

We offer a wide provision for international students coming to study with us. For those who have English as a second language, we offer weekly classes throughout each semester, along with courses before the beginning of each academic year.

We also have an International Buddy Scheme and hold weekly language lunches, bringing together staff and students from around the world, offering opportunities to practice languages, learn about other countries and build networks across the School.

A world of opportunities



Most of our students will have the opportunity to study abroad as part of their undergraduate programme. We currently have links with universities across Europe, the USA, South-East Asia, Australia and Canada.

Preparing for life after university

We take your employability seriously and encourage you to think about life after university from day one. We're here to help you develop the practical skills and professional confidence you need to succeed in your career.

We actively encourage our students to develop musical and critical skills that are suited to a wide variety of careers and workplaces. You'll learn musicspecific skills such as performance, composition and analysis, and academic skills including reasoning, comprehension, and oral and written communication.

The University's Student Futures team is also on hand to offer bespoke careers advice and guidance. They are available for one-to-one and online career planning sessions, CV-writing, skills workshops and more.



Enhancing your employability

Work skills are embedded into our modules, with our Business of Music modules offering the opportunity to undertake a work placement. Our students undertake placements in areas including artist management, stage management, orchestral management, education, music therapy, sound recording and postproduction.

Placement organisations include the BBC, Music Mark, National Youth Jazz Collective, Welsh National Opera, Southbank Sinfonia, Touch Trust and Monteverdi Choir & Orchestras. Our students also have the opportunity to work or volunteer abroad through the University's Global Opportunities team.

Our graduates have gone on to enjoy successful careers with the BBC, Arts Councils, Glyndebourne Opera, English National Opera, Oxford University Press, the National Trust, and London Symphony Orchestra, along with a range of other industrial, commercial, educational and charitable organisations.

Single honours degree programme



Music (BMus) UCAS Code: W302 or G85D with a year of study abroad

Our most in-depth programme of study, allowing you to focus all your time specialising in and studying music.

This programme will provide you with rigorous training in traditional skills such as composition, performance, theory and analysis, as well as exploring developments in ethnomusicology, music history and musicology.

Core modules will help you to develop a solid broad-based musical education, while optional modules offer you the opportunity to study topics including film music, ethnomusicology, jazz and popular music, as well as those related to different periods, styles and genres of Western art music. Students on this programme can opt to take specialist modules in composition. You can also take a specialist performance module with a public recital in your final year. One-to-one supervision is available if you opt to take one or two of the major written projects available in Dissertation, Music Analysis or Ethnomusicology.

If you elect to take our any of our practical performance modules, you'll receive fully funded tuition on your principal study instrument or voice.



The School of Music provides an environment where I'm exposed to a wide range of musical paths, some I didn't even know about until I arrived.

Joint honours degree programmes

Music and English Literature (BA) UCAS Code: WQ33

Combine studies in literature, music and culture with creative and practical skills development, opening doors to a variety of career pathways.

This flexible degree programme will help you develop critical and creative thinking, encourage your understanding and appreciation of diversity, enable you to communicate to a high standard and foster your resilience and independence.

Explore English literature from different periods and cultures, and across the range of principal literary genres. You won't be restricted to studying the printed word: we're intrigued by the connections between literature and film, art, history, technology, language, and everyday life, and our teaching reflects these interests.

Your music studies will include a range of academic modules which will develop your understanding of music theory, and ensure you're equipped to critically and reflectively assess styles and techniques. Alongside this, you'll be encouraged to take full advantage of our exciting ensembles.

Welsh and Music (BA)

UCAS Code: QW53

Discover the richness of Welsh language, literature and culture alongside music. Taught in collaboration with the School of Welsh, this course aims to produce graduates with a thorough academic and practical understanding of the Welsh language, a high level of skill in written and spoken Welsh and a broad-based musical education.

Music modules will allow you to specialise and develop your musical interests, while Welsh modules will develop your key skills in the fields of language and literature. This programme is suitable for students who have studied Welsh as a first or second language.

Music and a Modern Language (BA) UCAS Code: R753

Study the language, literature and history of French, Spanish or Chinese while gaining a broad education in music.

Our aim is to help you become a 'global citizen' who thinks critically and creatively, understands and appreciates cultural diversity, and has a wealth of transferable skills.

You'll develop high-level communication and critical-thinking skills, and foster resilience and independence. You'll also participate in creative and practical musicianship studies.

Your third year will be spent studying or working in a country where your chosen language is used. This experience will offer you opportunities for professional and personal development, and a route into deeper social and cultural understanding, friendships that cross borders and adventure.

Applications

To be considered for entry onto any of the undergraduate courses offered by the School of Music you should apply through UCAS.

Applicant days

Once we have received an application, if it meets our entry requirements, we'll invite you to visit the School for a tour of our world-class facilities and a one-to-one meeting with a member of staff. During this visit, you'll have the opportunity to attend talks and workshops, speak to staff and current students, and get a feel for what it's like to study with us. It also gives us the chance to get to know you better.

One-to-one meetings take the form of an individual 15-minute meeting with a member of academic staff, during which you will be invited either to perform a short piece of unaccompanied music on your principal instrument or voice or—for those whose interests lie more in composition or musicology—to bring along a composition for discussion, or suggest a musical work or topic about which to have an informal chat. This is followed by a short discussion about your musical interests and a chance for you to ask us any questions you may have.

A lot of people who come for an applicant day say how much they enjoyed the day, and it allows us to have a fuller picture of you than a UCAS form provides.

Typical entry requirements

A-levels:

AAB-BBB. Must include Music.

Applicants without an A-level in Music will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Extended/International Project

Qualification: Applicants with grade A in the EPQ/IPQ will typically receive an offer one grade lower than the standard offer. Please note that any subject specific requirements must still be met.

BA joint honours

Please refer to our online course information for specific requirements for each joint honours programme. International Baccalaureate: 32-31 overall or 665 in three HL subjects. Must include grade 6 in HL Music. Applicants without HL Music will be considered on a case-by-case basis.



Baccalaureate Wales: From

September 2023, there will be a new qualification called the Advanced Skills Baccalaureate Wales (level 3). This qualification will replace the Advanced Skills Challenge Certificate (Welsh Baccalaureate). The qualification will continue to be accepted in lieu of one A-Level (at the grades listed above), excluding any specified subjects.

BTEC: Extended Diploma in Music DDM-DMM.


GCSE: GCSE (or equivalent): Maths and English Language at Grade C or Grade 4.

Specific requirements: All applicants are expected to have gained or shown evidence of working towards Grade 8 in one instrument, or voice, at the time of application.

Other: Applicants without A-level Music will be considered, provided they can show evidence of appropriate music performance and theory skills (such as Grade 6 Music Theory) and/or are studying appropriate qualifications. We also welcome applications from those who may have combinations of qualifications or other relevant work/ life experience.

English language: For those applicants whose first language is not English or who have not had a substantial part of their education taught in the English language, evidence of ability in English is required, such as a score of 6.5 in IELTS with a minimum score of 5.5 in each category, or an equivalent qualification.
